
# New Nordic initiative regarding sustainable textiles and fashion

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## WHY CLOTHING?

- The 4th most significant consumption category in terms of environmental impacts in EU;
- Expected growth in consumption as the global middle class go from today's 1,8 to 4,9 billion in 2030 and spendings double






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#### The global middle-class wave
